Celebrating 150 Years of Service

Vincentians from around the world and throughout New Zealand will gather in Christchurch for a weekend of anniversary celebrations in October.

This year the St Vincent de Paul Society celebrates 150 years since it was first established in New Zealand. The first Conference was formed in Christchurch in 1867 and has flourished in Catholic parishes throughout New Zealand since then. Today the Society has around 6,000 members in New Zealand, including associates and volunteers, 23 Area Councils and 135 Conferences.

Anniversary celebrations are planned for the weekend of October 13-15 in Christchurch.
On Sunday October 15, an Anniversary
Mass will be celebrated by Apostolic
Nuncio Archbishop Martin Krebs as well as
Bishops Owen Dolan and Charles Drennan.
Celebrations will also be attended by

representatives of countries with which New Zealand has 'twinning programme' arrangements - Tokelau, Tonga, Sri Lanka and Samoa. Other international guests will include the Council General International Representatives, Tony Muir, and International Territorial Vice-President, Frank Brassil.

"The weekend will be a wonderful opportunity to give thanks to God for all the blessings the Society has enjoyed over 150 years," says Terry Comber, National President of the Society. "We remember especially our brother and sister Vincentians on whose shoulders we are standing, those caring people who have gone before us over many decades,

carrying out their Vincentian vocation often under very trying conditions."

In addition to the Christchurch celebrations, local Conferences of the Society are also hosting local events and celebrations, such as the very successful garden party which was held in Hamilton in July.

The Society has published a special Anniversary Publication to mark this major milestone in its history. The publication includes a visual timeline of the major milestones in its 150-year history, as well as reports about what local Conferences have been doing around the country. In his message to Members, Cardinal John Dew said: "the Church in New Zealand and New Zealand Society owes an incredible debt

of gratitude to the members of the St Vincent de Paul Society who have worked quietly and humbly to care for others in the name of Jesus.

"I offer deep thanks for the way you have been Christ's presence to those who needed a sign of hope and a gift of love and generosity."

The St Vincent de Paul Society is the largest Catholic lay organisation in the world. It is estimated that the Society's 800,000 members work with around 30 million people in need worldwide.

Nelson Vinnies Youth Receive Award


On Monday 26 June, the Young Vinnies in the Nelson/Tasman region received a commendation in the Education and Child/Youth Development section of the Trustpower Community Awards for their work in the community.

This is the third Trustpower Community Award these young people have received since 2011 and is a tribute to the time and effort that these young people put in to helping people in need.

The award which is based on work in the community from June 2016 – June 2017, was introduced by Trustpower stating, "Over the past year these students have been involved in projects bringing entertainment to senior citizens of the community, practical resources to people in need and a sense of purpose for those who have worked with the group from the wider community.

Thank you for empowering our young people with the opportunities and knowledge that they too can make a positive difference in our community."

Not only does this award bring both recognition and encouragement to our young people, it also shows the important value the Vinnies youth programme has not only in our local area but throughout New Zealand. Catering for our young people through providing them with the skills to help others is something that the Society of St. Vincent de Paul can truly take pride in.



Edgecumbe

Following the delivery of washing-machines, fridge-freezers and other whiteware goods, we have been able to support the victims and residents of Edgecumbe by visiting a number of them in their homes, sleep outs, garages and other abodes of temporary accommodation.

We accompanied our S.V.d.P. National President, Terry Comber and our Past-National Presidents Des Mulhern as we visited the devastated Puriri Crescent and Rats Avenue residents and saw the homes directly affected by the breach in the stop-bank by the Rangitiki River. There is no doubt that it will take many months before all the evacuated families are able to return to their homes and some 17 families will not be able to return to their homes as they are condemned. The National Presidents saw for themselves exactly what the situation is; and where the generous donations of our parishioners and those of the Diocese of Hamilton and further afield along with other individuals and organisations, will be spent.

Our Area President Brenda Whelan, working closely with the District Council Representative, Paula was informed that the Edgecumbe Community Hall was to close and the distribution of donated goods such as furniture, household equipment and other essentials would be housed in other dedicated locations in Whakatane, i.e. the vacant Holden Building on Bracken St. and the Old Coundown Building in Kopeopeo.

At a meeting attended by over 200 residents and interested parties, many questions were raised about the ongoing situation and residents concerns were voiced. These questions are being collated and organised into a coherent manner by Jade Elliot and her helpers to be put to the relevant authorities. Residents who have lost their property and whose homes are under repair need to visit their properties daily and meet for support and companionship. This need is being undertaken by the residents themselves and are able to meet in the Presbyterian Church Hall of St. David on College Road. St. Vincent de Paul Conference in Whakatane are supporting this initiative by providing tea, coffee, milk, sugar and biscuits and by being a presence to support individuals who require household items as they return to their homes on a more permanent basis.

The present Whakatane Conference President, Margaret Maynard, Sister Margaret O'Niell the Conference Spiritual Director, Breen Metcalfe the Conference Treasurer and Trish Murphy our local resident will together be the S.V.d.P. local point of contact. They will be liaising with all the various agencies concerned with the ongoing support including the Council reps., the diocesan reps., the S.V.d.P. Area and National bodies, the Edgecumbe Community through the Primary School and Edgecumbe College and the Community Board, in order to fulfil the huge ongoing task in which we have been involved from day one of the disaster.



A call for Prayer on the 10th, 20th and 30th of the month

On the occasion of the International General Council Meeting this coming June 14-16th, a new program will be launched proposing a common prayer for all those who share in the Vincentian vocation: in the year when we celebrate the 100th anniversary of the appearance of Our Lady of Fatima (May 13th to October 13th), the 400th anniversary of the Vincentian Charism (September 27th) and the 20th anniversary of Ozanam´s beatification (August 22nd).

The spirit of this initiative is to motivate each member of the SSVP to take 15 minutes every 10th, 20th and 30th day of each month to ask the intercessions of our Lady of Fatima, St. Vincent and Blessed Frederic Ozanam for the prayer intentions of the poor, for ourselves, for our families and for the other members of the SSVP.

May our prayers serve to commit ourselves more fully to the Lord, through the spiritual union of all members of the SSVP and our families, along with the Poor, "our masters", as Saint Vincent de Paul used to say.

Vincentians support Bishops' Statement

The New Zealand Catholic Bishops' Election Statement, Step out and Vote, has received a resounding endorsement from the St Vincent de Paul Society.


Society President Terry Comber said that the social issues that the Bishops raise are at the forefront of the Society's work.

"On behalf of Vincentians in New Zealand, I would like to publically support their Statement.

"We encounter people every day who are facing the personal and social challenges the bishops are talking about – particularly lack of affordable housing, mental health issues and the struggle of many elderly in our society to get by each week. Their situation cannot be ignored. It is up to everybody from politicians to local communities to address these issues.

Terry Comber urges Catholics to read the Statement carefully and act on its guidance.

"The Bishops' Statement covers complex topics honesty and sensitively. It shows real awareness of what the reality is out there, a reality that our members are encountering every day.



When we vote, we need to consider the common good and the vulnerable in New Zealand society, not just ourselves."

The Bishops' statement calls for a tax structure which is fair to low income earners and advocates a thorough review and strengthening of the mental health sector. It calls the growing prison population a "national disgrace", and advocates pro-life attitudes and policies from inception to the last days of life.

The Bishops emphasise the role faith has in the public forum. It calls on all brothers and sisters in Christ to let faith guide them in their political choices, and to vote in accord with what's best for all of New Zealand, not just the individual voter.

"Faith has a vital role in the public forum," says the Bishops' Statement. Stand up, uphold the common good of our nation, choose wisely and your vote will be a blessing for our nation."
