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New Welfare Centre and Vinnie's Op Shop Opens in Timaru

The Society's new Timaru shop was declared officially open on Saturday 31st January, 2015 by the Deputy Mayor of the Timaru District, Mr Richard Lyon, in front of over 100 guests, including the Hon. Jo Goodhew, MP for Rangitata, the National President Des Mulhern, representatives of donor organisations, members and volunteers.

Fr Brian Fennessy of the Holy Family Parish, Timaru led prayers of blessing.

The ribbon was cut by long-term members Noeline Brennan and Gerald Brosnahan who have over 110 years of service between them, and Young Vinnie James Kissell.

Rushton Architects designed the new charity shop, welfare centre and food bank, and Timaru Construction completed the building on time and on budget. The new building replaced the old shop, which was assessed as an earthquake risk.

The Rebuild Committee received generous support from all sections of the local South Canterbury community, as well as from local and national trusts, the National Board of St Vincent de Paul and many dedicated volunteers.

In his opening address John Foley, Chair of the Rebuild Committee and President of the Mid and South Canterbury Area Council, paid tribute to all the volunteers who were behind the project who 'contributed their enterprise, zest and generosity'. He also said, "This working shop will reflect the humanity of God, and we wish that for years to come it will act as a beacon of charity in the midst of South Canterbury."

The recently opened Vinnie's Op Shop in the Wellington suburb of Karori is part of the newly established Otari Conference.

The shop has one manager and six volunteers and does a roaring trade in woman's fashion, in particular business attire or name-brand clothing. Well-maintained antique furniture is also quick to sell out. The staff have many regular shoppers return so have made it easier for them by adding a rack for new stock and a sales rack for older stock.

The Vinnie's Op Shop has established good relationships with the surrounding shops, who often donate goods to them. The shop fits in well with the boutique stores that line the street of Karori and with plenty of passing trade, is operating very well. Funds raised from the shop support welfare programmes, such as food parcels, social work, free budgeting advice, pregnancy assistance and more.

Volunteers also wear SDVP name badges, which help customers of the shops and the foodbank identify more clearly with who they are working with. It also helps volunteers to feel part of the organisation.

Fred has worked tirelessly to help others and is known for the way in which he is nonjudgemental and compassionate. Fred still cuts and delivers fire wood to those who need help with heating in the winter and gathers donations of food and household items and distributes them to those who need a helping hand.

The St Francis Xavier Conference, Whangarei gave out 95 Christmas parcels to families. Ten volunteers packed the parcels, made up of Christmas presents, Christmas food and a food parcel, and eight volunteers distributed them to families from Waipu in the south, to Moerewa in the north. The majority of the presents were donated by the parishioners of St Francis Xavier Church and members of a local craft group.

Winning Christmas Nativity Float – Palmerston North

A nativity-themed float won \$500 in the annual Palmerston North Christmas Parade. Conference members from Palmerston North and students and teachers from Our Lady of Lourdes School won the educational section of the parade ahead of 11 other floats.

The aim of the float was to 'Keep Christ in Christmas' so the children dressed as Mary, Joseph, angels, wise men, shepherds and barn animals.

Higgins Contractors kindly provided a low loader truck and driver free of charge.

The prize of \$500 was shared between St Vincent de Paul and Our Lady of Lourdes school.

Marie Palmer - 2015 New Year's Honour Recipient



53 years ago, a few days after her husband had been hospitalised in a hit and run, Marie Palmer answered a knock at her door.

It was a moment that changed her life.

The two visitors standing at her doorstep were from St Vincent De Paul and

they had come to deliver a Christmas hamper and toys for her 10 month-old baby and support if she needed it.

"I'll never forget that day," Marie said. "And I made a promise to them and to God that I would dedicate my life to SVDP when I retired. And after twenty years as a hospice nurse, that is what I did."

After following the 'passion in her heart for helping people', Marie has been awarded a Queen's Honour in this year's New Year Honour's list for her contribution to St Vincent de Paul and the other social organisations she supports in Hawke's Bay. In May she will be invested at Government House.

Marie believes that this honour is a wonderful opportunity for others to hear about the work of St Vincent de Paul.

For Marie her contribution through the Sacred Heart, Hastings Conference and the Hawke's Bay Society Area Council, the other organisations that she works for, and her work as a JP, comes from a wish as a six year-old to help others. "If there is a need, then you go. It becomes a normal part of your daily life."

Marie spends a day a week at the Vinnie's shop helping to assess those who need food parcels, as well as those who require more support. On a Tuesday, along with Brother Bryan, a Champagnat Marist brother, they visit those who have been referred by the shop, schools, parishes or social agencies. Visits are not just oneoffs but are repeated until they can see some stability in the home. For many, these visits are marked in the calendar and are something to look forward to. And for some it may be the only outside visit they receive.

Marie believes that there is a lot of loneliness in the community. She and Brother Bryan believe that many people trust them because they are non-judgemental, they build up trust and they make repeat visits. Marie says that the work is very rewarding and that it's good to see a smile on a sad face of someone in despair.

"Life is great ... you learn something from somebody every day. You can always find a positive thing in a grim situation, even if it is just a thank you from a grateful person or family," she says.

Marie has always been an advocate for those struggling and trying to do their best on very little. She says that she knows what it is like for many families, as she had to cope with a husband in hospital for three years, a baby to look after and very little to live on.

"I think it helps that I can remember what it was like to really struggle," she says.

Like so many volunteers in St Vincent de Paul, Marie wishes to continue her work for as long as she can.

"I'll burn out, not rust out," she says. "And I might retire when I'm 105."

Joan was ruthless when sorting the items being donated, only the very best going into the shop. Prices were set so that those with little money were able to afford quality items; items that they could perhaps have only dreamed of owning. This soon drew people from all corners of Auckland.

Joan was in the shop every day of the week and even on weekends could be found putting out new stock and discarding the old.

She will be so missed by the way in which she was there for people when needed. She quietly offered a shoulder to weep on or a sympathetic ear to listen to the problems that people brought to her. She will truly be missed sorely by many.

Joan was a true Vincentian, epitomising the words 'Helps People'.

May she Rest in Peace to receive the rewards of her work.
